respects the environment
without sacrificing aesthetic

like all kinds of projects; I'm super democratic," laughs Jessica Helgerson, interior designer to not only the rich and famous, but regular folis and businesses as well, Jessica, and her associate Penny Herring, work with like-minded clients who "think gerea" and believe in the firm's philosophy of creating environmentally sensitive and sustainable interiors using natural, recycled and notwoic materials.

Whether working with architect Jim Hill on a strate blee house in Start N rac for Eileen Prilifich, spructing go Sec Grifton's Montecino pad, finding treasures for director Andrew Davis adobe hacierda, decorating the Montecino bom of a decoron director designing and instilling a Colde latticher mendel, the 22 yearedd stresses the importance of using organic cottons, herep, antiques and firmishings made from sustainably harvested woods as well as non-toxic pains and finishes. Projects include both commercial ubout 376% and residential deproximately 76% buildings. Current commercial projects include the Donald Ben School of Environmental Studies at UCSB.

Helgenon's office is a prime example of her design philosophy. The first hilm one notices upon entering is the west smell of seg grass floor covering. Each room has been designed using tested green materials including lime paint in one office, marmorino (a natural plaster finish) in another, and shelving made of recycled concrete from boards in the library-all enhanced by bamboo furniture and antiques. Her extensive fites on green resources (ranging from recycled wood flooring to hemp fabric suppliers) are nearly organized in recycled vintage filing calvines, which her Rolodex is filled with the phone numbers of trade people, builders and fabricators who share her firm's sensibilities.

"I want to inspire other designers and architects to do the same," asy Jessica, who is actively involved in environmental non-profit organizations such as the Community Environmental Council, The Sustainability Project and the Green Building Alliance. "This is not a trend, but a lasting change that all of us need to be aware of."
